
## October 9th at St. John's



"America; I Too" Draws its title from the Langston Hughes poem "I Too," and is as much a work of protest and community organizing as it is a work of art. The film features a predominantly immigrant cast and crew including over 250 Extras, most of whom are undocumented immigrants living in greater Los Angeles, the San Fernando Valley, and Lancaster, California. The cast and crew worked together to shoot the short in just three days, creating an empowerment tool for immigrant communities desperate for education around what to do in the event of arrest or pending deportation couched in a personal and moving story. Facilitator will be Adonis Flores (MCHR board member, Michigan United) and Melanie Goldberg (immigration lawyer).

### October 16th at St. John's

"Everyday Racism in America (MSNBC)" We will be using a short clip from the show that was broadcast - "Confronting Police and Vigilante Violence?" Unarmed African Americans have been shot and killed by police and white vigilantes at an alarming rate. The brief video and speakers will address this violence and the legal and activist challenges to such violence. Facilitator will be Mark Fancher, (ACLU).





## October 23rd at St. John's

"Detroit 48202: Conversations Along a Postal Route" Explores history and change in Detroit, through the lens of an African American postal worker, Wendell Watkins, and the customers on his route of 29 years. Wendell and the filmmaker have been friends since they attended Cass Technical High School in the 1970s! Wendell is our guide to the diverse voices along his postal route. From them viewers learn about the multi-generational history of working class Detroiters pushing against boundaries of racial and economic segregation; industrial and political disinvestment; and the creative ways residents are working to re-imagine an inclusive, equitable, and productive city. Facilitators will be Abayomi Azikiwe (MCHR board member).

## October 30th at St. John's

"Water Warriors; Nothing in this world can live without water." Water Warriors is the story of a community's successful resistance against the oil and gas industry. When an energy company begins searching for natural gas in New Brunswick, Canada, indigenous and white families unite to drive out the company in a campaign to protect their water and way of life. Facilitator will be Marian Kramer (MI Welfare).
